I am delighted to send my best wishes to you all. May I commence by thanking Matthew Gilsenan and Deirdre Shannon for the beautiful entertainment, and Mary Kennedy and Marty Whelan for hosting this important event.

The most recent census showed that 4.1% of our population are unpaid carers, a statistic that adds up to many thousands of people who are, every day in homes across the country, providing generous care for parents, children, partners, or other family members or friends. This evening we celebrate those remarkable people within our society who so selflessly commit their lives to the emotional and physical needs of a loved one; centering their days around that person and ensuring they have all they need to live their lives as fully and enjoyably as possible.

I am aware that, for so many of you, this year has come with particular challenges as we face, together, the challenge of the coronavirus pandemic. Indeed, recent months have brought into sharp focus the vital contribution that our carers make to our society.

The task that you undertake is not an easy one. It is those instincts that lie at the heart of the vital and selfless work carried out by those who care for others, seeking no reward or praise as they work quietly and with emotional integrity to craft a better world for those in their care.

I am delighted therefore, to have the opportunity to express my gratitude and admiration directly to each and every one of you. Your commitment, empathy and generosity provides a shining light in the lives of so many and you are inspiring examples of selfless commitment, generous concern and the great humanitarian instinct which lies at the heart of all ethical societies.

It has been a great pleasure to have this opportunity to speak to you all. I thank you for the work you do and for being such inspiring role models in a world now navigating its way towards what I sincerely hope will be a better future for us all.
